




"Ulo"ulo red


The bright shining lā means the day is here. Look at all the bees buzzing here and there.






Let's pound the kalo to make yummy poi and share with our friends for all to enjoy.








Three friendly nai'a love to play and play, in the moana where they splash all day.


Nā hōkū shine brightly in the sky with delight. It's time to lie down and whisper, "Good night."

'Ōpakapaka fish live deep under the sea swimming in the water as happy as can be.







Pulelehua silent in the sky, share their great beauty with all who pass by.





High in the mauna snow falls on the peaks. Let's bundle up tight. We don't want cold cheeks!




"Thinghing of the second of th
